

GCSE : English Literature

Course Description

English Literature will enable learners to:

- read in depth, critically and evaluatively, so that they are able to discuss and explain their understanding and ideas
- develop the habit of reading widely and often
- appreciate the depth and power of English Literary Heritage
- write accurately, effectively and analytically about their reading, using Standard English
- acquire and use a wide vocabulary, including the grammatical terminology and other literary and linguistic terms they need to criticise and analyse what they read.

GCSE in English Language and GCSE English Literature

Assessment Objectives:

AO1: Read, understand and respond to texts. Students should be able to:

- maintain a critical style and develop an informed personal response.
- use textual references, including quotations, to support and illustrate interpretations.

AO2: Analyse the language, form and structure used by a writer to create meanings and effects, using relevant subject terminology where appropriate.

AO3: Show understanding of the relationships between texts and the contexts in which they were written.

AO4: Use a range of vocabulary and sentence structures for clarity, purpose and effect, with accurate spelling and punctuation.

Teaching & Learning: students will study for two external examinations

Paper 1: Shakespeare and the nineteenth century novel

- 40% of the total GCSE marks
- Closed book (students are *not* permitted to take copies of their texts into the exam)
- Candidates are required to read and understand a prescribed play by William Shakespeare and a prescribed novel written before 1914.

Section A: Shakespeare: Students answer a two-part question on the play they have been studying. Students must answer on an extract provided in the exam and then on the play as a whole.

Section B: Nineteenth-century novel: Students answer a two-part question on the novel they have been studying. Students must answer on an extract provided in the exam and then on the novel as a whole.

Paper 2: Modern texts and poetry

- 60% of the total GCSE marks
- Closed book (students are *not* permitted to take copies of their texts into the exam)
- Candidates are required to read and understand a prescribed British novel or play and study a cluster of 15 poems from a prescribed anthology as well as preparing to answer on unseen poetry.

Section A: Modern text: students are given a choice of two questions on the text they are studying and must answer one.

Section B: Anthology poetry: students must complete a comparison of two of the poems they have studied.

Section C: Students must answer a question on an unseen poem and then a comparative question on that poem and a second unseen poem.

Progression to Further Education

Students who achieve a grade 9-4 may progress onto A-Level English courses in the Sixth Form.
