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
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Vision & Values

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
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Catholic Life & Mission

Catholic Life & Mission

At St Robert's we want students and staff to feel comfortable to explore their relationship with God, whilst realising that the members of our school community come from different backgrounds, beliefs, and faiths. Our school is a place, where all are valued equally and belong. We strive to create an environment where pupils can encounter the love that God has for each of them. With Christ at the centre, our school seeks to exemplify faith in action, working for justice and compassion, manifest in acts of charity and kindness. We work for those in need, and instil an ethos of care, kindness, and respect. As an inclusive family, we seek to help and care for the most vulnerable and marginalised. Our community is built upon values, which are inspired by the Gospel and the Church. Our values are visible in the environment, relationships, interactions, and our day-to-day life.

Chapel & Chaplaincy

Our Chapel and Chaplaincy Team are at the heart of the Catholic life of St Robert's. Staff and students with a wide range of skills and talents enhance the faith of our community. Our Chaplain offers opportunities and participation for all our pupils enabling them to grow in their spirituality, be confident in expressing their faith and demonstrate leadership in matters of social justice, environmental stewardship, and meaningful prayer & reflection. The breadth and depth of the Catholic life opportunities offered to our students is something we strive for each day to allow all members of the community to let their light shine.

Retreat

We offer an exciting retreat programme to ensure that all our students can develop spiritually, morally, socially, and culturally. Our retreat programme offers pupils the opportunity to spend a few days in prayer, work, and reflection. A retreat is a time where our students can step back from their daily lives to re-charge and then re-emerge revitalised. We work in conjunction with the Diocesan Youth Ministry Team as well as our long-standing connection with the SVP on Holy Island:

- Lindisfarne (Holy Island) toward the end of Year 7
- Year 8 and 9 can visit Emmaus Youth Village in Consett
- Years 9, 10 and 12 can attend the Diocesan Summer Festival at the Youth Village
- Year 11 enjoy a morning of celebration before they receive their 'Record of Achievement' at the Stadium
 of Light
- Y12 can visit the Emmaus Youth Village in Consett.
- Y13 enjoy a 'Day of Celebration' to mark the end of their journey at the school

Prayer & Worship

Students at St Robert's can take part and take a lead on daily prayer and reflection. Our pastoral tutor team meet with our students each morning, and with the support of the school chaplain, they take part in prayers that reflect our weekly themes or focus upon the liturgical season. In addition to daily prayer, students have a weekly form of collective worship with their Head of House, a member of the school's leadership team or with their fellow students taking the lead. Our collective worship follows the diocesan format of gather, listen, prayer and mission.

Faith & Formation

Students at St Robert's, with our school values at the fore, are given the opportunity to develop into the people God intended them to be. Helping them to grow in their relationship with Christ in order that they can respond to God's calling which is unique to them. The school's motto *luceat lux vestra* (Let your light shine) encourages all members of the school community to work for the greater glory of God and the common good. This 'work' could include involvement in our Catholic co-curricular programme which further enhances their personal formation and consists of:

- REcreate (newly formed club ran by the RE department)


Pilgrimage

Students at St Robert's can take part in the Diocesan pilgrimage to Lourdes, Year 7 visit to Holy Island and the annual pilgrimage to Rome for our Year 11 and Sixth Form students (please note that these opportunities have not occurred recently due to COVID, however, we will share more details as and when they return)

Sixth Form

Sixth Form students celebrate the liturgical life of the Church through promotion of the liturgical seasons and saints' day in the weekly newscast on the information screens in both Sixth Form blocks. This is also promoted through the Sixth Form social media accounts.

Year 13 students mark the end of their two years with a Day of Celebration. This starts and ends with a liturgical service. The day covers several reflective activities during which students can share their progress, successes and celebrate all that has given them dignity and development as a whole person.



Pastoral System

House System

St Robert's is structured around a pastoral House System:

- Durham House (St Cuthbert)
- Finchale House (St Godric)
- Lindisfarne House (St Aidan)
- Whitby House (St Hilda)

Each house is led by a Head of House who are supported through assistant Heads of House and pastoral tutors. The Houses each have a designated link from the senior leadership team. The Heads of House, in conjunction with their teams, focus on ensuring that the following areas are a priority in the development of students:

- Attendance
- Punctuality
- Expectations & Behaviour
- Safeguarding
- Counselling, Mental Health & Wellbeing of pupils

Heads of House and their teams are responsible for the delivery of collective worship in school. The Heads of House lead centrally planned assemblies and acts of worship which are underpinned by our school values. In addition, the pastoral team support the development of students through monitoring their achievement and behaviour. Achievement is rewarded in the following ways:

- Platinum, Gold, Silver, and bronze awards based on achievement points gained
- Termly Pastoral Tutor awards
- Termly Head of House awards
- Ongoing School Values awards

Behaviour is monitored through a pastoral reporting system:

- Yellow Head of House report
- Red Senior Leader Report
- White Head Teacher Report

Heads of House, and their teams will employ sanctions consistently and fairly, in line with the behaviour policy of the school. These include:

- A verbal reprimand
- Extra work or repeating unsatisfactory work until it meets the required standard.
- The setting of written tasks as punishments, such as writing lines or an essay.
- Loss of privileges
- Missing break time.
- Detention
- School based community service or imposition of a task
- Regular reporting
- In more extreme cases schools may use temporary or permanent exclusion.


Sixth Form Pastoral Structure

Year 12 and Year 13 are led by a Head of Year and Assistant Head of Year. The Sixth Form has taken St Thomas Aquinas as their patron, a saint that sought to fuse philosophy and theology as a single approach to life. St Thomas Aquinas, as a Doctor of the Church, pursued a life of academic study founded on a strong life of faith.

The Head of Sixth Form and Heads of Year, in conjunction with their teams, focus on ensuring that the same areas are a priority in the development of students as followed by Lower school:

- Attendance
- Punctuality
- Expectations & Behaviour
- Safeguarding
- Counselling, Mental Health & Wellbeing of pupils

The Head of Sixth Form, Heads of Year and their teams are responsible for the delivery of collective worship in Sixth Form. The Head of Sixth Form and Heads of Year lead planned assemblies and acts of worship which are underpinned by our college values. In addition, the pastoral team support the development of students through monitoring their achievement and behaviour.



Transition Programme

Transition Programme

The St Robert's community welcomes students from a wide range of primary schools. However, our five official feeder primaries are:

- St Joseph's Catholic Primary School Washington
- St Bede's Catholic Primary School Washington
- St John Boste Catholic Primary School Washington
- Our Lady Queen of Peace Catholic School Houghton le Spring
- St Michael's Catholic Primary School Houghton Le Spring

To assist students in their transition from KS2 to KS3, we facilitate lessons throughout the year for their target language of French or Spanish as well as visits to our school to participate in activities such as Science lessons. We complete transition days, which welcomes students into their tutor groups and their House system, as well as a range of activities across different subject areas.

Ongoing Transition Activities

As part of our ongoing transition programme, Year 6 pupils can take part in:

French - our Head of MFL and 6th form linguists offer to deliver basic French to all year 6 pupils across all feeder schools, to give them a taster of French as well as ease their transition in MFL in year 7.

Science - our Science department offer to deliver two session to each feeder school over the year whereby year 6 students gain experience of our laboratory and scientific skills.

Physical Education - our PE department offer festivals to the 5 feeder primary schools throughout the year. Some are at St Roberts; others are at a feeder primary school or an allocated facility like Houghton Rugby Club. Year 12/13 BTEC students and Year 9 leaders are used to help run and lead the events:


- Reception = Teddy Bear Picnic

Art - The Art department and sixth form artists deliver lessons to year 5 focussed on planning and designing stained glass windows.

Summer School

Curriculum Offer

Staff received training in preparation for the new RSE curriculum and we will be making use of the training available from Chameleon PDE.





Duke of Edinburgh Bronze Award

Students in Year 10 are invited to work toward the 'Duke of Edinburgh Bronze Award'. The award is comprised of four sections:

1. Volunteering

Carried out for approximately 1 hour per week continuously for 3 months. This section is designed to promote independence in the participant and allow them to help in the community. Usual volunteering activities include helping at Brownies/Cubs group, working in a charity shop, litter picking/beach clean. The work



that the participant undertakes must not take the form of a role that would usually be paid, nor can they receive payment themselves.

2. Physical

Carried out for approximately 1 hour per week continuously for 3 months. Any physical activity, either team based or individual. It can be an existing activity, or the participant can start a new one.

3. Skills

Carried out for approximately 1 hour per week continuously for 3 months. The participant can develop an existing skill, such as playing a musical instrument, or learn a new skill. The skill cannot be sport based unless it is umpiring/refereeing.

4. Expedition

The fourth section of the Award is the expedition. At Bronze this takes the form of a two-day, one night walking expedition, assessed by an assessor. We will be carrying out training sessions on a Wednesday afterschool for an hour. We also run a practice expedition to help prepare the participants for the Qualifying expedition.

The Scholars Programme

Students in Year 9 and Year 12 are invited to take part in 'The Scholars Programme' ran by 'The Brilliant Club'. The Brilliant Club works with schools and universities across the UK. They mobilise the PHD community to support students who are less advantaged to access the most competitive universities and succeed when they get there.



In 2022 we are delivering 3 placements of the Scholar's Programme run by Brilliant Club at St Robert's. Students study a supra-curricular (an area outside of their normal curriculum) taught by a leading PHD student within the field. We have 2 placements of Y12 students and 1 placement of Y9s completing the programme. Students will complete a 2000-word final assignment and their work will be graded using the university system (1st, 2:1). The best work may even be published!

KS4 intervention

GCSE students are supported in their studies by a comprehensive intervention programme run by subject departments. All intervention is centrally tracked to ensure that there is good distribution of students who are selected across all departments and to monitor the impact of the sessions.

The intervention listed below is generally held over 5-7 weeks with teachers assessing the progress of the students in an informal way at the end. To ensure that students are supported and not over-loaded, most will only be invited to one or two nights of intervention within each round.

Year 10:

Within Year 10 intervention is mostly focused around in-class interventions. Teachers will intervene within their lesson time to ensure that concepts and substantive knowledge is secured. Any gaps within learning and misconceptions are corrected through lunchtime intervention sessions run by class teachers when necessary

Year 11:

Four rounds of formal after school intervention are held across the year

Round 1:

Autumn Term: Students work with teacher in small groups to target, practice and correct misconceptions and important exam skills

Round 2:

Spring Term: This round of intervention is linked to Year 11 practice examinations and the groups are selected based on student performance in these assessments.

Round 3:

Spring Term: Tutorial Intervention: During one half term, selected students work with the Subject Leaders of English, Maths and Science. This is an intensive in-school intervention designed to have a substantial impact on the core subjects


Round 4:

Summer Term: A final round of intervention runs up until the formal exams begin in May. This round of intervention targets and final misconceptions and is often used to consolidate exam skills


Gatsby Benchmarks

PSHE & RSE at Home / Safeguarding / School Values

On top of trained staff delivering high-quality resources, our PSHE programme will also ensure that parents can support their children in their personal development journey. Likewise, we will ensure that safeguarding is prioritised, and all students are aware of who they can speak to.

Our PSHE & RSE @home scheme:

We believe that parents are the first educators of their children, and we feel it is key to involve them in the learning process for PSHE and RSE. In 2022 we will be launching our updated PSHE and RSE resources and sharing these with parents in advance of the students receiving the lessons. This is to help initiate discussion about what has been taught in school.

Contextual Safeguarding

Alongside the PSHE and RSE curriculum, students will also receive lessons and assemblies based on contextual Safeguarding issues. These lessons and/or assemblies will focus on local issues in Washington & Sunderland. These lessons/assemblies are planned in conjunction with our Designated Safeguarding Lead who works with external safeguarding authorities and the Police in the planning process.

Safeguarding Slide

At the start of each PSHE and RSE lesson, Form Tutors will refer to the safeguarding slide which contains information about who to go to/what to do if a student has a concern about anything that may have been raised in the lesson. This helps to foster a safe environment for discussion and debate and reminds students about the support that is in place.

Anne Frank Trust

St Robert's is a link school for the 'Anne Frank Trust'. In partnership with the trust, we offer students (often specifically chosen cohorts) the opportunity to take part in workshops led by experienced facilitators on issues such as homophobia, racism and gender discrimination.



Our link to the 'Anne Frank Trust' was closely aligned to the work of our DSL and our approach to 'Prevent'. Our catchment area has seen a notable increase in cases of hate speech, homophobia and far right extremism. We hope that by involving students in these workshops will help to challenge the prejudice and discrimination that our young people may be subjected to.

What is the 'Anne Frank Trust'?

Using Anne Frank's life and diary as a starting point, we empower young people with the knowledge, skills, and confidence to challenge all forms of prejudice and discrimination. In doing so, we partner with schools, local authorities, the criminal justice sector, and others to deliver educational programmes alongside acclaimed exhibitions to young people in a variety of settings.

As a link school we will run core programmes led by the Anne Frank Trust as well as their workshops covering a range of anti-discrimination topics.

Winter term 1: Anne Frank Exhibition: St Roberts will host the Anne Frank exhibition with Y9 students trained as guides. The guides will then run the exhibition as students, parents and the local community visit and are educated about the life and impact of Anne Frank and her family

Winter term 2: Workshop Programme: Anti-Racism. All Y8 students will receive a workshop relating to racism and racist behaviour. They will be empowered to examine their own behaviour and use of language as well how we can make our school more inclusive and freer from discrimination

Spring term 1: Voices of Equality: Y7 students will be involved in this 2-day programme in which students will look at how different forms of discrimination affect people in Britain today. In the second day of the programme, students will produce assemblies and leaflets to educate the wider school on these themes.

Spring term 2: Workshop programme: Gender equality and homophobia. All Y9 students will receive a workshop relating to gender equality and homophobia.

Volunteer Equality Ambassadors: Year 12 and Year 13 students of History, Sociology and Politics have volunteered to become equality ambassadors. They will support the delivery of the sessions and will continue to promote the work of the Anne Frank Trust across the year
